In the aftermath of last weekend's tornado that has devastated parts of east Greensboro, many faith communities are seeking ways to help. The most helpful response right now is to make a financial donation to help people who have been displaced from their homes or who will have major repairs. The Volunteer Center of Greensboro is keeping an updated list of volunteer opportunities: <a href="https://www.volunteergso.org/">https://www.volunteergso.org/</a> Keep in mind that needs change daily and that hands-on volunteering might not be the most helpful right now. Again, financial donations for rebuilding and relief are the most needed response.

Interest in helping out will likely wane as the news cycle moves on, but the response to this crisis will last long past the immediate needs. We need to be committed to long-term investment in the impacted neighborhoods, listening to community leaders who are on the ground there, and working with organizations like the Housing Hub (<a href="https://greensborohousinghub.org/">https://greensborohousinghub.org/</a>) to help people get back into their homes. The Greensboro Faith Leaders Council is currently working on an op-ed piece calling on our community to work together not just in the immediate aftermath of this storm, but for as long as it takes to help people rebuild, repair, and move back in.
